Fast Track Cities Durham

Fast Track Cities is a global HIV prevention initiative, and its overarching goal is to end HIV transmission. Fast Track Cities Durham is one of the international partners working towards achieving this goal via advocacy, policy development, community engagement, and educational programming. All activities are informed by Fast Track Cities Durham's strategic plan and input from the advisory group.

The Fast Track Cities Durham Community Advisory Group's primary objective is to inform, guide, shape, support and evaluate the three core global objectives with an emphasis on Durham. With a 95% success rate by year 2030, these aims include: 1) Providing HIV prevention and treatment education along with increasing "accessible" testing efforts in underserved communities; 2) Creating a social media presence to educate, elevate awareness and combat HIV stigma by addressing it as a definitive barrier and providing concrete strategies and tips to end it; 3) Promoting the benefits of PrEP and TasP (Treatment as Prevention) as viable tools to prevent HIV and viral suppression (Undetectable = Untransmittable). This group meets quarterly for updates, sharing, guidance, planning, delegation and process evaluation.





Fast Track Cities Durham also has two active social media accounts: Facebook and Instagram. The purpose of these accounts is to promote the Fast Track Cities Durham Initiative, HIV prevention and treatment education, and HIV related community resources. We also aim to address the debilitating barriers of stigma as well as ways to "inclusively" combat it. Relevant content is developed, and supportive information is posted to these sites on a regular basis.

Some of Fast Track Cities Durham activities to date are the annual curation of World AIDS Day for the Durham County Government, the Women and PrEP Symposium, Social Media HIV Prevention and Treatment Campaign featuring area artist Linette Knight, "Moving from "Risk" to "Reasons" workshop and workshops on addressing stigma and discrimination in healthcare settings. In 2019, the NCDHHS, DPH, Communicable Disease Branch (CDB) finalized the Ending HIV Epidemic (ETE) Plan for North Carolina. The plan was clear that all work would be viewed from an anti-stigma lens, and the state would work to assure that all people have equal and unbiased access to testing, to care, and to services. However, due to a lack of funding to implement a statewide anti-stigma initiative and campaign, the Data to Action team looked for other resources to support this effort.

The Data to Action team, along with staff from other program areas were chosen to participate in NMAC's Minority HIV/AIDS Fund (MHAF) Initiative – Ending Stigma through Collaboration and Lifting All to Empowerment (ESCALATE) Project. The project was a 15-month (Nov 2021- Jan 2023) training and capacity building initiative specifically designed to address HIV related stigma, and works directly with RWHAP Parts A, B, C and D organizations. After examining HIV data collected across the state, the newly formed Stigma Reduction Team (SRT) determined that a toolkit would serve as the product outcome for the ESCALATE project. The SRT researched resources to include in the stigma reduction toolkit that would assist state funded agencies in the Regional Network of Care and Prevention to address HIV related stigma in their work and community settings.

The Stigma Reduction Toolkit is a guide that provides resources to compliment and work hand in hand with the ETE Plan for NC. The toolkit offers information and evidence-based strategies to assess, plan, implement, communicate, and evaluate HIV related stigma initiatives. The CDB Stigma Reduction Toolkit is tentatively scheduled to be released for early summer.

North Carolina Participates in NMAC's Escalate Training in Albuquerque, NM

NMAC's (National **AIDS** Minority Council) "ESCALATE" trains and empowers participants to recognize and address HIV stigma within every level of the Ryan White HIV AIDS Program. ESCALATE will engage Stigma Reducing Teams (a minimum of two participant teams) within the 57 jurisdictions identified in Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America (EHE) with a particular focus on reducing stigma towards transgender/gender nonconforming individuals, men who have sex with men, the American Black/African community, Latinx experience, and Indian Country and Native Alaska.



The Escalate training is making a significant impact by empowering individuals living with HIV to contribute meaningfully to the planning and delivery of HIV services, especially in communities disproportionately affected by the virus. Attending the training in Albuquerque, NM was enlightening and provided valuable insights that I can bring back to strengthen the SEEDS of Healing board and advocacy efforts. I am feeling empowered and grateful for the opportunity to learn and grow personally and professionally.

I would also like to take this time to extend a grateful thank you to Alicia Diggs, the Office of Community Engagement Manager of the CFAR and Cassandra Durham, the Program Coordinator of the North Carolina HIV Training & Education Center, for the opportunity to learn more of the dynamics with experiments done to the Black and Indigenous populations by connecting back to colonization. I had a wonderful time learning, spending my evenings with family in the area, and meeting new contacts in Indigenous Hospital Services (IHS), that I can reach out to for support.
