Neutze named Chair of Primary Care Improvement Collaborative

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

Founding class of FIRST Residents graduates program

The members of the inaugural class of the FIRST (Fully Integrated Readiness for Service Training) Program will be graduating this June. Thane Campbell, MD, and Kyle Melvin, MD will be the first to complete the program, which offers an accelerated 3-year medical school curriculum and conditional acceptance in an affiliated residency program, followed by three years of service in North Carolina with ongoing support in practice.

The FIRST program was developed in 2015 by Cristy Page, MD, MPH, former chair of the Department of Family Medicine and now Executive Dean of the UNC School of Medicine, to link the family medicine workforce pipeline from medical school to residency followed by service in rural/underserved parts of North Carolina. FIRST is directed by Family Medicine's Catherine Coe, MD.

Upon graduation, Melvin will be heading to UNC Primary Care at Chatham starting in August, with part of his time spent at Chatham Hospital working on the inpatient service and the maternity care center as a newborn provider. Campbell will head to Midway Medical Center in Clyde, NC, after his residency.

I specialize in sports medicine and non-operative orthopedics and love taking care of runners, athletes, and patients of all ages and activity levels. I have particular expertise in ultrasound guided injections including corticosteroids, hyaluronic acid, platelet rich plasma, dextrose prolotherapy, needle tenotomy, and high volume injections to treat various orthopedic conditions including osteoarthritis, bursitis, tendinosis/tenosynovitis, frozen shoulder and plantar fasciitis. I also have expertise in running medicine and perform gait analysis, custom orthotic fabrication, stress fracture work up and management, and compartment pressure testing. In



recent years I have become interested in myofascial pain and the use of trigger point injections to treat acute and overuse injuries. Finally, I enjoy non interventional sports medicine as well including the management of concussions, minor fractures, sprains, and strains.

UNC OA study recruiting participants

UNC's Thurston Arthritis Research Center is conducting a research study titled OsteoArthritis Physical activity Care Pathway (OA-PCP). This is a National Institutes of Health funded study and has also been approved by the UNC Institutional Review Board. Patients from UNC Family Medicine may be contacted about the study. Here are some study details:

- The overall aim of the project is to test a telephone-based program for helping patients with OA to increase physical activity levels
- Participants will be identified through diagnosis codes in UNC electronic health records
- Participants will be excluded if they have any health conditions that would make moderate home exercise unsafe
- This is a clinical trial. Participants will be randomized to one of two telephone-based interventions: the physical activity coaching intervention or an arthritis education control intervention
- Participants in the physical activity coaching intervention will also be linked to additional OA-appropriate physical activity resources.
- No in-person visits are required for the study
