Family Medicine Faculty Secure \$5 Million HRSA Grant for Residency Training Technical Assistance Center, Boosting Health Workforce Funding to Nearly \$13 Million

Just prior to Thanksgiving break, <u>UNC was awarded a 3-year \$5 million HRSA grant to create a Teaching Health Center Planning and Development Technical Assistance Center (THCPD-TAC)</u>. The new funding is in addition to <u>\$4.3 million awarded</u> in August 2021 and \$3.6 million awarded from 2018 through 2020 from the HRSA Federal Office of Rural Health Policy for the <u>Rural GME Center</u>. UNC School of Medicine Executive Dean and Family Medicine Professor Cristy Page, MD, MPH, founded the Rural GME Center, a national consortium of experts in medical education, health workforce and rural health policy, in 2018 during her tenure as Chair of the Department of Family Medicine. Emily Hawes, PharmD, BCPS, CPP, an Associate Professor in the Department of Family Medicine and the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy, helps direct the national consortium and serves as Co-PI.

cooperative efforts. The consortium also includes the University of Washington, the

University of Wisconsin, and the UNC Adams School of Dentistry, among other community and academic partners across the country.

The consortium has produced extensive research on rural and underserved health workforce development, which has resulted in new policies that support increased access to rural and underserved care. In partnership with HRSA, they have directly supported the development of 283 new rural training positions accredited in the last 2 years, spanning internal medicine, family medicine, general surgery, and psychiatry and worked to create the next generation of rural health leaders. The new award reflects the continued successful partnership with HRSA, as well as the positive results generated by the Rural GME Center. Moving forward, Page and team will expand their existing rural efforts to additional underserved communities in partnership with community health centers across the nation. The team will support 47 new teaching health center programs in the specialties of family medicine, psychiatry, pediatrics, internal medicine, general dentistry and pediatric dentistry.

Standard Black Doula Program Awarded Duke Endowment

Congrats to assistant professor Venus Standard's Alliance for Black Doulas for Black Mamas (ABDBM), which was recently awarded a \$525,000 grant from The Duke Endowment for Black doula training to decrease maternal mortality rates in North Carolina! The program, led and entirely staffed by Black women, will continue its recruitment, support, and funding for Black doula training to decrease maternal mortality rates. Its unique strength is a holistic approach to addressing perinatal morbidity and mortality in the Black community. Families who receive care from a doula have been shown to have fewer medical interventions, infants with higher birth weights, fewer birth complications, and are more likely to breastfeed, all leading to decreased maternal and infant mortality and morbidity rates.

With initial support from the UNC C. Felix Harvey Award to Advance Institutional Priorities, ABDBM graduated its first class of nine Black doulas in July and eleven in September 2021. The 3year grant from The Duke Endowment will support



the training of 120 new Black doulas from Alamance, Durham, Granville, Guilford, Orange, and Wake counties and has a goal of 2,000 total mothers and families served by the end of the grant period. Training these new doulas will increase access to doula services for Black pregnant persons by 300 to 600 families per month moving forward.

NC FIT Awarded Duke Endowment Award to Enhance Program

<u>David Rosen</u>, MD, PhD, associate professor of medicine in the division of infectious diseases, is principal investigator of a study that will review the <u>North Carolina Formerly Incarcerated Transition (NC FIT) Program</u>, funded by a three-



year, \$580,000 Duke Endowment Award.

Founded in 2018 by <u>Evan Ashkin</u>, MD, NC FIT connects formerly incarcerated individuals who have a chronic

disease, mental illness and/or substance use disorder with appropriate healthcare services and other reentry resources. The program is a partnership between UNC Family Medicine, the North Carolina Department of Public Safety (which administers the state prisons), the North Carolina Community Health Center Association, Federally Qualified Health Centers, County Departments of Public Health, community-based reentry organizations and local reentry councils.

"When Evan founded NC FIT, it was clear that this was a really important accomplishment because there is such a huge gap in our public health infrastructure for those being released," Rosen said. "Since its founding, I have gradually become more involved in the NC FIT program's evaluation efforts." Ashkin said the project will help to determine the effectiveness of NC FIT to address these issues, and its impact on access and disparities if it were expanded further across the state.

"NC FIT is still the only statewide organization focused on connecting people to essential health services after release from jail or prison," said Ashkin. "We struggle to provide funders, policymakers and others with regional data about our work to support expansion across the state. We are very excited about the Duke Endowment supporting our efforts to understand how to better serve this highly marginalized and vulnerable population."

Thomas named "Community Star" for NC by National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health, Guest Lecturer for Farm Toxicology Course

Congratulations to Gayle Thomas, MD, who was named North Carolina's 2021 Community Star by The National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health (NOSORH) for her vital work as Medical Director of the NCDHHS Office of Rural Health's NC Farmworker Health Program! From the NOSORH Community Stars publication:

"Gayle Thomas has been a Community Star Her whole career, dedicated to serving underserved populations," said Elizabeth Freeman Lambar, ORH Farmworker Health Program Manager. "However, during the pandemic, Dr. Thomas has gone above and beyond every day since March 2020, and she has been a champion of the Farmworker Vaccination Plan that vaccinated more than 27,000 farmworkers with an acceptance rate over 90%."

Dr. Thomas has been in the role of Medical Director of the Farmworker Health Program since 2013, running a mobile clinic where she manages a team of physicians, nurses, residents, and medical students who drive out to migrant farmworker labor camps to deliver care to migrant farmworkers, many of whom have traveled here from Mexico on a temporary agricultural guest worker visa program. Her efforts to educate others in the care of this population have led to the

creation of a medical student elective in Migrant Health at the UNC School of Medicine and a required two-week Vulnerable Populations rotation for the UNC Family Medicine Residency.

Dr. Thomas was born to missionary parents in the Republic of Congo, where she discovered aspirations to work in medicine. Her motivation to work with the farmworker community originated from her experience working with these unique health needs during a rotation as a resident in rural Oregon. She states, "It has been a privilege to bring attention to the needs of these men and women who play such an essential role in our society by growing and harvesting our food. Farmworkers experience so many barriers to healthcare, including low wages, lack of transportation and health insurance, language barriers, and work hours that often last from sunrise to sunset, 6 days per week without any paid time off. Unfortunately, our society prefers that we not know about the working and living conditions of the people who provide us with our food."

Dr. Thomas will be retiring at the end of the year, with Family Medicine Assistant Professor Modjulie Moore, MD, assuming the role at that time. Her efforts to train and support future leaders working with underserved populations will leave the program prepared to continue delivering high-quality care to our most vulnerable.

addressing structural racism. The collaboratives are part of the Cross-sector Innovation Initiative (CSII), which comprises 10 partnerships working toward sustainable collaboration to advance equity and improve population health.



Faculty Collaborate on Study Linking Global Health Electives in Med School to Future Work With Underserved Populations

UNC Family Medicine faculty Nadja Vielot, Sylvia Becker-Dreps, Don Pathman, and Martha Carlough collaborated with Global Health's Shay Slifko and Emergency Medicine's Justin Myers on a study resulting in a recent research article published in BMC Medical Education. The article, "Students with global experiences during medical school are more likely to work in settings that focus on the underserved," discusses their findings assessing the association of global electives in medical school on subsequently working in global health and with

underserved populations in the U.S., additionally considering students' interests and experiences prior to medical school.



The study surveyed medical school graduates from classes 2011-2015 to describe current practice settings and previous global health experience. It evaluated work, volunteer, and educational experiences preceding medical school, socioeconomic status, race,

and ethnicity using American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS) data, and assessed the association between students' backgrounds, completing global health electives in medical school, and current work in global health or with underserved populations in the U.S.

The study found that medical school graduates who participated in global electives as students were more likely than their peers to pursue careers with underserved populations, independent of experiences prior to medical school.

Baca-Atlas on WRAL Discussing Record Increase in Overdose Deaths

Michael Baca-Atlas, MD, who works as an addiction fellow at UNC WakeBrook behavioral health facility, was recently on WRAL TV discussing how illicit fentanyl is contributing to the record 37% increase in overdose deaths in the past year in North Carolina, and how expanded access to healthcare and insurance coverage can have a positive impact on those suffering from addiction.
